Her journey has been diverse, encompassing teaching and leadership roles in New Zealand, consultancy work for the University of Auckland, and acting as the head of a school in Hampshire.

## STAFF AND PROFESSIONAL SUPPORT



Millie Vickery Coach

Millie, a seasoned and devoted instructor, is recognised as a British Horse Society Accredited Professional Coach and an affiliated British Eventing Coach. She participated in the GB Coach Pathway programme under the guidance of Yogi Briesner and had the opportunity to train alongside accomplished individuals like Pippa Funnell and Carl Hester. Millie has taught Equine NVQ courses at Kingston Maurward College and has competed at the 5\* level in eventing with different horses. Her passion lies in educating riders on understanding their horses to maximise their potential, and considers it a crucial life skill.



Emma Fisher Coach and Sports Psychologist Emma has competed Internationally in three sports (athletics, eventing and triathlon). She holds a degree in Sports Science and Psychology, a masters in Psychology, Level 3 Coaching Award, and recently received the Centre 10 Gold Award for Excellence in Coaching. Emma coached and developed the Irish Junior Eventing team for five years before being selected to coach, develop and lead the Great Britain Young Rider Eventing team as Chef d'Equipe (with many Bronze, Silver and Gold medals over her 14 years in post). Emma recently set up her own Mentoring and Coaching business, which supports athletes competing from equestrian grassroots to 5\* level, Commonwealth Games and International athletics and clay pigeon shooting competitors. Emma feels strongly that progressing a coaching partnership with her riders is about communication, development, support and listening to the athlete so they can be confident, happy and inspired to reach their own specific goals.











#### Feeding and Bedding

All feeds are made up and horses fed by a member of the yard staff. Feeding times are as follows:

• Morning feed: 07:00

• Lunch feed: 12:30

• Evening feed: 19:30

A basic feed of fibre, nuts, and sugar beet is included within the Livery package, although you are welcome to use your own feed if you wish.

We use shavings as bedding. At the start of each term you will find your bed made ready for your horse. Over the course of the week you can add one additional bale of shavings to keep your horse comfortable.

#### Riding in Your Free Time

Loaners and liveries have the opportunity to ride in their free time after school and in their free periods during the school day (by arrangement with the Yard Manager and academic staff) and during yard opening times at weekends. All horses will have at least one day off a week.

Hacking will be undertaken with a member of the Academy staff escorting. Horses must not be ridden around the school grounds.

Jumping is not permitted unless you are in a lesson.

The lunge pen is only available to use under supervision unless the rider has their Pony Club Lunge Test certificate.

#### Extra Services

We can offer clipping and trimming services as follows:

The cost will be added to the school account at the end of term.

BTEC students are allowed to stay in their riding kit during their other lessons in school providing they are clean and dry. Muddy footwear must not be worn into school. There are changing facilities at the Academy for BTEC Students to use.





#### Yard Rules


#### Arena Rules

- Enter when permission has been given.
- Pass left hand to left hand.
- Avoid walking on the outside track once trotting has commenced.
- No halting on outside track.
- Give way to horses in canter.
- The gates to the arenas must always be closed when riding.
- All horse droppings must be picked up at the end of your riding session.
- All jumps and poles must be left as you found them.
- Arena lights must be turned off at the end of the session.

#### Yard Rules

- Horses must always be tied up inside to be groomed, tacked up and mucked out.
- Maximum of two students allowed in a stable at one time.
- Horses must not be tied up outside their stables.
- Horses must be cross tied in the wash boxes and solariums.
- Tack must be cleaned after every use.
- The yard must be kept tidy and swept at all time.
- Horses should always be well groomed and never go into a lesson dirty.
- Feet must be picked out every time a horse leaves the stable and stable doors closed.
- Litter must be placed in the bins provided.
- String, sacks and plastics must be disposed off in the relevant recycling bins.
- There is no access to the feed room without permission.
- To prevent back injuries and to keep the yard tidy at all times, hay and bedding must always be carried in a wheelbarrow.
- All gates must be shut at all times including field gates, even if they were already open.
- Pupils must not ride another pupil's horse without permission.
- Pupils must always wear and hat and gloves when taking horses to and from the field.





## Riding Kit for lessons and training • A protective helmet (for riding and turning out) that complies with British Safety Standards. Hats must have been correctly fitted by a reputable saddler. Hats will be checked on a regular basis. Any hat not found to be of the correct standard, damaged or ill fitting will be confiscated. • Long hair should be neatly secured in a hair band or hairnet. • A suitable top, polo shirt or skin. A long sleeved skin and body protector are required for any xc training. Navy or dark grey jodhpurs or breeches. • Riding gloves. • A body protector compliant to British Safety Standards is recommended for show jumping and is compulsory for cross country. A body protector must be fitted by a reputable saddler. • Black or brown riding boots, preferably jodhpur boots (most comfortable and easiest to ride in). Half chaps may be worn with jodhpur boots; they protect the lower leg, prevent from rubbing and also help to keep the rider's leg in the correct position whilst riding. Half chaps must be black or brown only, tassels are not allowed. Long rubber boots are not ideal for a younger rider as they make it difficult for the rider to put the leg in the correct position and therefore apply the correct aids. They may also be uncomfortable. • A coat is necessary when riding outside in the winter and must be fastened at all times, in order not to flap and frighten the horse. Jewellery is not allowed. ## Competitions

Training for competitions takes place throughout the term as part of weekly training sessions for the riding squad. This might also involve training with discipline specialists from outside of the school.

A list of competitions is available to riders each term. Team selection takes places well in advance of an event. Riders and their parents are informed of their selection by the Director of Riding.

Transport to events is generally the responsibility of the rider and their parents but the school will help pupils who are not local and this is not possible to arrange.

#### Competition Levels

Grassroots (NSEA) Team and Individual from 40cm to 70cm Show Jumping and Dressage competitions this enables anyone aged between 4 and 18 to compete for their school as an introduction to competing.

Mini (NSEA) Team and Individual 70-75cm cm Show Jumping, Eventers Challenge, Jumping with Style and ODE.

Novice (NSEA) Team and Individual 80-85cm cm Show Jumping, Eventers Challenge, Jumping with Style and ODE.

Intermediate (NSEA) Team and Individual 90-95cm cm Show Jumping, Eventers Challenge, Jumping with Style and ODE

Open (NSEA) Team and Individual 1.05 - 1.10m Show Jumping, Arena Eventing, Jumping with Style and ODE.

Dressage (NSEA) Team and Individual Prelim, Novice and Elementary

# EQUINE MANAGEMENT (BTEC Level 3) SIXTH FORM

Equine Management offers two different options to students: BTEC Level 3 Extended Certificate (Equivalent to one A Level) or BTEC Extended Diploma (Equivalent to three A Levels)

#### **NATIONAL EXTENDED CERTIFICATE**

This qualification offers an engaging programme to students who want a career in the equine sector. It can prepare learners for a range of apprenticeships in the equine sector. When taken alongside further qualifications, it supports progression to a range of higher education courses in equine management and other career choices. There are four mandatory units and you will choose one optional unit.

#### **Mandatory Units:**

- ·Unit 1 Equine Structure, Form and Function
- ·Unit 4 Work Experience in the Equine Sector
- ·Unit 5 Horse Tack, Equipment and Rugs
- ·Unit 6 Equine Health and Husbandry

#### **NATIONAL EXTENDED DIPLOMA**

This qualification is equivalent in size to three A Levels and will normally be the only qualification in a two-year study programme. This qualification will serve as preparation for a higher education course. This route gives learners the opportunity to enter the sector at a higher level, or in a more specialist role. There are nine mandatory units and six optional units.

- ·Unit 1 Equine Structure, Form and Function
- ·Unit 2 Equine Diet and Nutrition
- ·Unit 3 Managing Equine Disease
- ·Unit 4 Work Experience in the Equine Sector
- ·Unit 5 Horse Tack, Equipment and Rugs
- ·Unit 6 Equine Health and Husbandry
- ·Unit 7 Preparation and Presentation for Competition Disciplines
- ·Unit 8 Equine Behaviour
- ·Unit 9 Managing an Equine Yard

Optional Units might be chosen from these:

- ·Unit 10 Equine Business Management
- ·Unit 11 Horse Fitness
- ·Unit 14 Theory of Training horse
- ·Unit 18 Estates Skills and Grassland Management
