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ABOUT LEWESTON

Mission

To provide a well-rounded and relevant education to boys and girls focused on the individual learner. To instil an independence, resilience and willingness to try which provides pupils with the confidence to meet the challenges of the wider world. To build a community ethos of courtesy, respect and affection that has at its heart prayer and service to others.

Aims of the School

To give pupils an experience of life in a Christian community:

- By affirming each individual as a sacred and unique part of God's creation, and nurturing in each person a sense of dignity and self-worth.
- By valuing diversity and appreciating the contribution that every pupil makes to the life of the school.
- To provide the highest quality of teaching and learning, which is responsive to and supportive of the needs and aspirations of the individual.
- By fostering intellectual curiosity, a desire to seek truth, and a life-long love of learning.
- By enabling pupils to discover their own strengths and weaknesses, to learn from 'failures', and to develop the determination to persevere, in order to pursue their goals.
- By supporting all pupils in their pursuit of academic and personal excellence and ensuring every pupil can take part in the school curriculum.

To provide a programme of sport and outdoor learning accessible to all which supports and enhances pupils' personal development and academic achievements.

To forge relationships of trust and mutual respect between staff and students which contribute to the success of pupils in all aspects of school life.

To inspire pupils to develop their God-given gifts and be happy with who they are.

Size and Location

There are over 600 pupils on the Leweston campus across the Nursery, Prep and Senior Schools. The school is situated three miles outside of the historic abbey town of Sherborne in one of the most picturesque parts of Dorset. The Jurassic Coast World Heritage Site is only 30 minutes away. Good road and rail transport links mean Leweston offers a peaceful and secure environment with convenient access to London and the South West.

History

St Antony's School was founded in 1891 by the Religious of Christian Instruction who travelled from their mother-house in Belgium to promote an academic and spiritual education. St Antony's was the Order's first establishment in the UK. The sisters established two schools in Sherborne: St Antony's, a boarding school, and St Joseph's which offered free education to the local community until government legislation forced its closure in the 1950s.

In 1948 the demands of the Education Act saw senior pupils move to Leweston Manor, an extensive estate which dates back to the Middle Ages, where the school has been ever since. The Prep School continued in Sherborne until 1993 when the school was reunited on the Leweston campus. The school amended its name in 2007 to Leweston School but the school crest includes the reference to St Antony's.

Facilities

Leweston sits in 46 acres of beautiful parkland, providing a wealth of outdoor learning opportunities. As a through-school pupils of all ages can access a range of facilities often unavailable to separate Prep and Senior Schools.

The Prep School is located in the former Coach House with its own hall, tennis and netball courts and Victorian walled garden play area. The Prep uses the 'Enchanted Wood' for Forest School, which has a full outdoor classroom with all-weather awning and sufficient seating for a whole class.

Both schools share the Theatre, Dining Hall and Chapel which are on the Senior site. The Art and Design Centre is available to pupils of all ages providing two fine art studios, two Sixth Form studios, a pottery workshop, creative computer suite, dark room, 3D design and textiles studio. The purpose-built Science Centre has three laboratories, a project room and preparation room.

The Senior School is centred on the Grade I listed Manor House which houses the Music School including ensemble room, teaching and practice space and recording studio. Pensabene Library, with views over the grounds, doubles as lending library and ICT suite as well as a quiet place to study. It is the venue for evening prep as well as visiting lectures. The Sixth Form Centre, with easy access to the Library, provides a modern space to study and relax in.

Leweston's excellent sports facilities are enhanced by the grounds. There is an all-weather hockey pitch which converts to nine tennis courts in summer, six netball courts doubling as hard surface tennis courts, an indoor swimming pool, 300m grass track and synthetic long jump. The Sports Hall acts as an indoor netball and hockey court and provides four badminton courts, a conditioning suite and a range of Technogym cardio-vascular equipment.



A CATHOLIC SCHOOL

Leweston is a Catholic foundation which welcomes pupils of all denominations and none. Our distinctive ethos, based on sound teaching, moral guidance, pastoral care and the development of the spiritual life, is central to who we are and how we interact with each other.

The Chapel

The Chapel of St Antony is central in the life of the school as the place where Mass and other school services are celebrated. It also plays host to our Choral Society performance and other musical events. It is situated in the heart of the school and is always open so that pupils, staff and parents can find a quiet space.

Mass or Liturgy is celebrated on Wednesdays for the whole school. Pupils of all ages participate, from planning the liturgies and taking an active role in the choir, to performing as musicians or acting as servers and readers. Pupils of other faiths are supported in their own worship.

Chaplaincy Team

Although all members of staff are responsible for sustaining and developing Leweston's religious life, the Chaplaincy team, led by our Chaplaincy Co-ordinator, has particular responsibility for this. The team includes staff members and pupils. Meetings are held fortnightly to discuss the direction of the Chaplaincy, as well as areas for development. The Chaplaincy Team help to prepare pupils for First Holy Communion and Confirmation as well as support Anglican pupils with their own Confirmation classes.

Leweston has a Retreat programme with an event held for each year group over the course of the year. Some are in school whilst others see the pupils going away for a day or longer. Retreats are designed to give each pupil time to step out of everyday school life and reflect on their faith and their relationships with others.

SCHOOL COMMUNITY

Old Antonians

Former pupils are known as Old Antonians, or OAs. Pupils forge life-long friendships during their time at the school and the school co-ordinates a programme of reunions, publishes and shares news, and provides an internal mentoring scheme which aims to build a network of members willing to provide information and advice to both current pupils and OAs.

Leweston Enterprises

Leweston Enterprises offers a wide range of opportunities to get involved with a range of activities and services within the school community.

Cedars Café is a popular spot for parents and students serving coffee, cakes and light lunches.

The School Shop is stocked with uniform items as well as branded merchandise such as umbrellas, beach towels and the very popular tote bag.

There is also an extensive and varied events calendar with something for all ages and interests. Highly anticipated annual events include the Leweston Festival and Fireworks Night, both of which attract large crowds. There are also smaller events such as wine tastings, workshops and dining experiences.

Enterprises also provides a range of holiday childcare with daily and residential activities on offer.

The leisure facilities, such as the pool and tennis courts, are available for hire and a membership scheme offers facility use and range of classes. Regular timetables are published to members. To find out more visit www.lewestonenterprises.co.uk

Partnerships and Outreach

Since its foundation Leweston has been dedicated to serving the wider community. The school's Community Service and Charitable Giving Programme lie at the heart of what Leweston is about. Being able to support local and global communities by giving time and funds is an important part of understanding our world better.

Pupils engage in a range of activities which raise thousands of pounds for charity. Pupils of all ages involve themselves in these projects and are encouraged to develop and take ownership of their own ideas.

Leweston has a 30-year relationship with Jana Jyoti School in Nepal that began when a group of Sixth Formers trekking in the area made contact with the school. Over the years, Leweston has raised money to construct new school buildings, sent GAP year teachers, provided materials and funds a university scholarship.



PREP SCHOOL CURRICULUM

The content and style of the Prep School curriculum is designed to join seamlessly to that of the Senior School.

Pre-Prep (Reception to Prep 2)

Children in Reception follow the Early Years Foundation Stage programme, learning through cross-curricular activities designed to follow their interests. In addition to this, they have lessons in Music, PE, French, Spanish, Swimming and Forest School. From Prep 1 pupils study Art and Design, English, French, Geography, History, Computing, Mathematics, Music, Performing Arts, Physical Education, Religious Studies and Science.

Prep (Prep 3 to Prep 6)

The school delivers the 2014 Primary National Curriculum Framework where appropriate. As an Independent School, however, the curriculum is adapted as seen fit and the requirements and expectations of the National Curriculum are broadened with other opportunities. Pupils study English, Mathematics, Science, French, Latin, Geography, Religious Studies, Music, Performing Arts, Art and Design, ICT, PSHE and Physical Education.

SENIOR SCHOOL CURRICULUM

In the first five years the curriculum offers a wide range of options to keep open the maximum number of subjects to choose from in the Sixth Form. Students in the examination years are not expected to select their options from prescribed blocks or groups of subjects with the school aiming to offer flexible timetables designed to accommodate as many of the students' options as possible.

Key Stage 3 (Years 7 to 9)

Pupils have lessons in Art, Biology, Chemistry, Computing, Food Technology, Design, Drama, English, French, Spanish, Geography, History, Latin, Mathematics, Music, Personal and Social, Health and Relationships Education, Physics, Physical Education, and Religious Studies.

GCSE (Years 10 and 11)

Pupils normally take 10 subjects at GCSE at the end of Year 11. All pupils take GCSEs in the core subjects of English Literature, English Language, Mathematics, Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Religious Studies.

They are then free to choose up to three option subjects from Art, Computer Science, Design, Drama, Food Technology, Further Mathematics, Geography, History, Latin/Classical Civilisations, Physical Education and Music. Able mathematicians may also take Further Mathematics. In addition all pupils have PSHRE and Careers lessons as well as Games and Physical Education.

The School Week

The teaching week in both the Prep and Senior Schools is from Monday to Friday. The school day starts at 8.20am with registration and concludes at 4.20pm. There is a short morning break and a longer lunchtime break during the day.

After-school activities run from 4.30-5.45pm from Monday to Thursday for all years from Reception upwards with the programme varying each term. From Prep 3 to Year 13 there is the option of private study so that pupils can complete their homework before going home. Care for day pupils runs until 5.45pm but this can be extended by prior arrangement. School transport leaves at 5.45pm Monday to Thursday and 4.30pm on Fridays.

Sixth Form (Years 12 and 13)

Sixth Form students typically take three subjects. In exceptional circumstances four may be studied, usually when combining Mathematics and Further Mathematics. BTECs are available in Sport and Business.

All Sixth Form students participate in the Leweston Enrichment and Development Programme (LEaD), have lessons in Physical Education and have the option to study for an Extended Project Qualification.

All subjects provide enrichment and extension through external lecture programmes. Most departments use the theatre, field days, tours and study trips to support the curriculum. Some of these visits take place over several days and may be abroad.



PASTORAL CARE

Leweston prides itself on its reputation for high quality pastoral care. The school is entirely committed to providing an environment that inspires warmth, confidence, creativity and personal development in all our pupils, whether they attend as a day pupil or boarder. The school is of such a size that all staff know the pupils as individuals and can focus on their needs to ensure that every pupil's personal welfare is monitored and any concerns dealt with sensitively and effectively.

Forms, Houses and Tutor Groups

Each pupil at Leweston has a tutor (in the Senior School) or a Form Teacher (in the Prep) to guide their academic and pastoral development through their school life.

Tutors in the Senior School work in conjunction with the Head of Year. Boarders also have a Boarding Tutor, or Florin, whose role is to support them pastorally, providing an essential link between academic and boarding lives.

On entry to the school, each pupil is assigned to one of four Houses. The House system exists to foster a sense of belonging and translate the ethos of the school into action.

Peer Mentoring

At Leweston pupils are encouraged to support each other, with the older pupils playing an important part in the care of the younger ones. The peer mentoring programme is an integral part of pastoral care. Every September, Sixth Form volunteers undertake formal mentoring training before taking on the role of mentor to a new pupil entering the school. These relationships are designed to support new starters during their first term at Leweston with some forging links that last through school and beyond.

Well Being Hub

Our qualified nurses provide care in the Well Being Hub. They are in school to encourage pupils to take responsibility for their health and to help them when they are unwell or injured. The school doctor attends twice a week and is available on call at other times. In an emergency there are excellent hospital facilities in nearby Yeovil or Dorchester. The school counsellor also visits weekly and offers a drop-in clinic as well as pre-booked one to one appointments.

Individual Needs

The individual needs of pupils are catered for as appropriate, so that each pupil has the same opportunity to develop and succeed. This includes pupils requiring learning support, the especially gifted and talented, those with special physical needs, and pupils for whom English is not their first language. Every pupil is tested on entry to the school to ascertain whether they would benefit from extra support.

Higher Education and Careers Advice

Leweston aims to respond to the needs of each individual student, provide good quality, impartial careers guidance and raise student aspirations. The careers programme at Leweston is based on the eight Gatsby Benchmarks recommended by the government to ensure good practice in career guidance.

There is a comprehensive programme of careers activities which take place during PHSRE days and tutor time. During these sessions, information on the fastest growing job sectors is discussed, helping students to make informed career choices. The value of taking STEM subjects at GCSE and A Level is highlighted through videos and visiting speakers. Other topics covered include employability skills, interview practice, CV skills, LinkedIn profiles, the importance of extra-curricular activities and appropriate usage of social media.

Promoting equality and challenging gender stereotypes is a priority at Leweston, as well as a flexible and individualised approach to education and career guidance. Students in Year 11 and the Sixth Form are interviewed on a 1:1 basis to provide personalised advice. Career information is also delivered by subject teachers linking potential careers to topics within the curriculum with extensive help available from the tutor team, Head of Sixth Form and Head of Careers.

There are opportunities to meet employers and employees and, by utilising the extensive network of Old Antonians, many are willing to advise or mentor pupils considering their fields of study or employment. A number of employers and apprenticeship providers exhibit at the UCAS Higher Education Convention visit, which takes place in Year 12. This is followed by a dedicated Futures Directions Day including workshops on applying to university.



ADMISSIONS

School Visit

We encourage all prospective families to visit the school to meet the Head and view a normal teaching day. The Senior School also hosts an Open Morning in the Autumn term, which is an excellent way to see the school in action. However, you choose to visit staff and pupils will be available to answer questions. Booking forms are available on the website.

All prospective pupils have a taster day as part of the admissions process.

Registration

Registration ensures that your child is considered for a place at Leweston subject to the appropriate admissions process. Registrations are considered in the order they are received so we recommend that families register at least eighteen months before entry.

To register, parents need to complete a Registration Form and pay a non-refundable fee. Pupils must be registered before applying for a Scholarship or Bursary. Registration covers admission to both the Prep and Senior Schools. A registration can be deferred to another year subject to availability.

Offers of places are subject to availability, when year groups are oversubscribed there may be a waiting list in operation but the admissions team will remain in contact throughout the process.

Joining the Prep School

All prospective pupils are invited for a taster day when they spend a day with their year group and parents meet the Form Teacher. During the day there will be an informal assessment in literacy and numeracy conducted as part of the class lesson. Following the taster, and at the discretion of the Head, a place will be formally offered. Parents will be asked to secure the place by completing the Acceptance Form and paying a deposit.

Joining the Senior School

Entrance procedures to the Senior School depend on the prospective pupil's age. The main entry points are at age 11 into Year 7 or age 13 into Year 9.

All potential pupils attend a taster day in the June of Year 5. Entrance assessment for Year 7 takes place in the January of Year 6 when all candidates attend an Assessment Day. Boarding tasters may be available in conjunction with this.

Year 9 is a popular entry point particularly for pupils moving from Preparatory Schools. Candidates are invited for personal taster days during Years 6 or 7. For those interested in boarding it may be possible to offer boarding tasters on the night. During their visit candidates will meet current pupils, participate in lessons and take the school assessment. They will also have a short interview with the Headmaster. We request a preliminary school report at this stage.

Following the taster, and at the discretion of the Headmaster, a place will be formally offered. Parents will be asked to secure the place by completing the Acceptance Form and paying a deposit.

Applications for Year 9 should be with us by the February of Year 7, after this point offers can still be made but they will be subject to availability.

Potential scholars can apply for 13+ awards in the January preceding their year of entry.

Joining the Sixth Form

Leweston accepts a number of new pupils into Year 12 every year. We encourage all prospective Sixth Form entrants to come to the Sixth Form Information Evening in October where they can meet the staff and discuss their A Level and BTEC choices. They will also be invited for a personal taster day which provides the opportunity to experience Sixth Form.

Sixth Form candidates are welcome at all of our Open Events.

After the taster day references will be requested from the candidate's current school. Formal offers are made at this point, subject to GCSE performance. The standard entry requirement for students entering Sixth Form is 6 GCSEs at grade 5 or above with a grade 7 or above in the subjects they wish to pursue at A Level. Entry is at the discretion of the Head. Parents will be asked to secure the place by completing the Acceptance Form and paying a deposit.

All Sixth Form entrants will be invited to join our induction events in June.

For entry at all stages, candidates with a medical condition, a special educational need, a physical disability, or English as an additional language, are required to make this known to the school when they apply. Special provisions will be made in accordance with the school's Admissions Policy.



SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES

Scholarships

Leweston offers a range of scholarships at 11+, 13+ and Sixth Form to recognise the talent and potential of its pupils.

In 2023 scholarships will be available for Academic Excellence, Art and Design, Boarding (Sixth Form only), Drama, Music and Sport (including Equestrian and Pentathlon). The Year 7 Academic Scholarship will be awarded to the highest performing pupil in the Entrance Assessment.

Scholarships Guidelines are available on the school website or from the Admissions Team.

Bursaries

A limited number of means-tested bursaries are available each year for entry into the Senior School. Bursaries are awarded in cases of demonstrable need and it is expected that parents will make their children's education a financial priority with both parents expected to be in work before an application is made. All bursaries are subject to an annual review and pupils must be registered with the school to make an application. TRANSPORT AND LOCATION

Daily Minibus Service

Leweston offers safe and affordable daily transport options for pupils using the school's own minibus fleet. The buses cover a wide catchment area across Somerset and Dorset and, in combination with rail travel, Wiltshire and Devon.

The Leweston minibus service offers:

- Return and single journeys.
- Daily transport for Reception to Year 13.
- Flexible per trip booking.
- Weekly boarding options on Monday and Fridays.
- DBS-cleared minibus drivers employed by the school.
- Links with local public transport.

All buses arrive in school at 08.15am and depart at 6pm Monday to Thursday and at 4.30pm on Friday. Buses are charged per trip and booked online via the **school website**.

Travelling by Rail

Sherborne is on the South West Trains line between Exeter and London Waterloo. The journey time to London is approximately 2 hours 14 minutes, 90 minutes to Woking, 75 minutes to Basingstoke, 40 minutes to Salisbury and 70 minutes to Exeter. There are 24 trains daily and a rail/air link connection with Heathrow airport.

Travelling by Road

The school postcode is DT9 6EN. Leweston is situated off the A352 between Sherborne and Dorchester and is within easy reach of the A303 and A35 arterial routes. Traffic depending, London is approximately 2 hours drive, Bristol just over an hour and Exeter 1½ hours. Leweston School is clearly signposted from the A352, 2½ miles south of Sherborne or, travelling north from Dorchester, the turning is just after as you leave the village of Longburton.

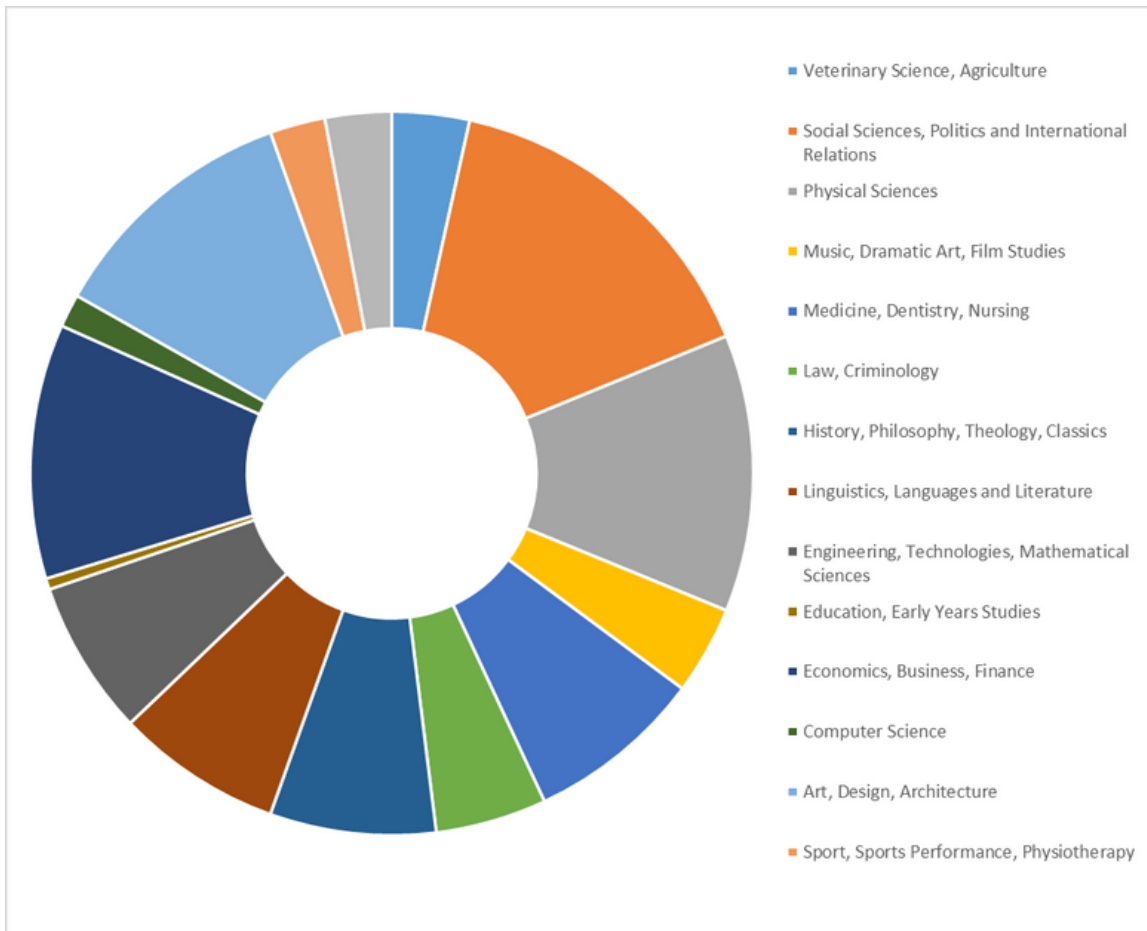
